FIELD STUDY REPORT OF III B.SC. ZOOLOGY 2018-19

COORG AND MALPE

The study tour as per the curriculum was an exposure trip to a place of educational and historical importance. So, the department conducted a trip to Coorg and Malpe. Former is a rural district in the Southwest Indian state of Karnataka and the latter is a natural port about 6 km to the west of Uduppi, Karnataka, India. The journey commenced on 11th December 2018 at 11 pm and ended on 14th December 2018 at 7 pm with 3 faculty members and 38 students.

On the way at Muthanga forest,bWayanad many wild animals including elephants, wild dogs and herds of white spotted deer were seen.

During the river rafting at Coorg, two crested serpent eagles and a Great Egret were seen. Great Egret are also known as the common egret, which are partially migratory. They feed on fish, lizard, frog, crayfish small rodents, insects etc. We also saw a little egret and a spotted dove on a tree. There was a Pond Heron and a Grey Heron on the banks.

The team also visited Nisurgadhama Bamboo forest which is a 64 acre area with lush foliage of thick bamboo grooves, sandalwood and teak trees. There were deers, rabbits and peacocks. There were Elephant rides and howing too. Coorg has been blessed by Mother Nature. The unending stretch of Western Ghats, the rich peat of Flora and Fauna and the fresh aroma of coffee in the air symbolises the beauty of Coorg.



FIELD VISIT ORGANISED BY THE DEPT OF ZOOLOGY

Malpe is an important port and a major fishing harbour of Karnataka coast. The visit to St. Mary's Island on the other coast in a boat was exciting with the view and cold breeze. St. Mary's Island also known as the Coconut Island, is a set of four small islands in the Arabian Sea of the coast of Malpe in Uduppi. There were many coconut trees on the island with lots of tender coconuts, the natural energy boosters. A a Hermit crab was seen over the rock. In addition Barnacles which are sessile, suspension feeders and have two nektonic larval stages were also seen. The entire island was covered with the second largest phylum of Invertebrates, Molluscs. We saw Perna, Mussels, Molluscs, varieties of Gastropods etc. There were also various varieties of fishes.

A field trip was arranged to College of Veterinary Sciences, Mannuthy and Athirapilly Waterfalls, Thrissur by the Department of Zoology. There were 33 students accompanied by two teachers, Dr. Ani Kurian and Dr. Gigi K Joseph. The atmosphere of the college was pleasing and welcoming since the campus was soothing and ecofriendly. In the museum, almost all the specimens were a visual treat for the students. The students were filled with innumerable knowledge about the intricate structures of animal anatomy.

Firstly, a huge electric eel was seen. The major attraction was the huge skeleton of the elephant in its mighty posture. It had depressions on the frontal region of its skull, widely spaced ribs, large femoral bones etc. A large collection various visceral organs and the embryological developmental stages of the animals were also displayed. Visceral organs like liver, kidney, pancreas and heart of various animals were on display. The next spot was the stable which housed varieties of horses. These were trained horses for republic day parade. The man in charge for the stable explained how the horses were fed. They were fed with a mixture of cereals, chopped grass etc. It requires large amounts of water daily. At the center of the college, there is a hospital where local people have access for treating their pets.

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FIELD STUDY REPORT – B.Sc ZOOLOGY I DC (2018-19) ATHIRAPILLY – VAZHACHAL, THRISSUR KOLE WETLANDS AND THRISSUR ZOO

A field visit to Athirapilly – Vazhachal, Thrissur Kole Wetlands and the Thrissur Zoo were organised on 22nd February 2019. A group of 36 students and 4 teachers were in the team.

The Thrissur Zoo is one of the oldest zoos in the country. A natural history museum and an art museum are also present in the zoo compound. Fauna at the zoo includes tigers, lions, deers, monkeys, hippopotamus, sloth bears, Pelicans, Peacocks, Hornbill etc. there is a special enclosure for snakes which includes cobras, kraits, vipers, rat snakes etc.

Our second destination was the Thrissur Kole wetlands. They are one of the largest and highly productive wetlands in Kerala. It is also one of the resting and feeding areas in the migratory routes of many birds and in terms of the number of birds, it stands third. Many bird species like the spot – billed pelican, black headed ibis, painted stork, oriental darter, spotted eagle etc. were observed in the Kole wetland.



FIELD VISIT TO ATHIRAPILLY AND VAZHACHAL

Final destination was the waterfalls of Athirapilly and Vazhachal, Athirapilly being the largest waterfall in Kerala. It is situated at the entrance to the Sholayar ranges of the Western Ghats. Many endangered and endemic species of flora and fauna are found in the forsts of Athirapilly –Vazhachal area. The wildlife of the area includes the Asiatic Elephant, bison, Sambar deer and the lion-tailed macaque. All the four south Indian species of hornbill are found here.
